The central idea behind the MADI-Prof. Calestous Juma Essay Competition is the need to change African mindset. Africa has long been stunted in regards to socio-economic transformation and growth due to the application of timeworn and non-workable systems and ideologies that are ill-fitted to our unique society. Spanning from the colonial period. Africa has inherit-

ed foreign systems and socio-economic ideologies that have hindered us from framing our own narrative and finding home-grown solutions to Africa's problems. MADI is dedicated to the development of home-grown African solutions to Africa's challenges and the creation of original ideas and innovations to boost Africa's development. Like the proverbial new wine in old wineskins, we believe that Africa cannot achieve all-round structural transformation and development in this new age without a corresponding move from these obsolete traditional perceptions. Essay Questions (Choose ONE question)

1.) "For Africa's mineral resources to be beneficial and valuable for all people, policy makers need to address not only the governance and sustainability of the extractives sector, but also to stimulate value addition and promote linkages with other sectors in the economy."

Do you agree? Suggest ways through which this goal can be achieved on a national, regional and continental level.

2.) An estimated third of the world's known mineral resource reserves are located in just a third of the explored parts

of Africa. Nevertheless, Africa has not benefited substantially from its mineral wealth for the past 6 or so centuries. Even the remarkable resource commodity-driven economic growth of the last few decades across the continent failed to trickle down. With the aid of research, critically assess the possible reasons behind this unfortunate state of events.

3.) By 2030, Young Africans are expected to make up 42% of the world's youth and account for 75% of those under age 35 in Africa. Increasingly, there is an opportunity for the mineral resource sector to play a role in bridging the unemployment gap and repositioning itself as an employer of choice as well as a key job creator on the continent. Suggest ways through which the youth in Africa can harness the mineral resource sector to create opportunities for sustainable economic development.
